NEWS OF OUR REGIONS AND GROUPS

East Anglia Regional Day

On 4 October the three Secular Order communities of East Anglia, Mother of Carmel and St. Henry Morse, Quidenham, The Holy Family, Norwich and Our Lady Mother of Divine Grace and St Joseph, Letchworth met at Quidenham Carmel for our Regional Day. There were more than twenty five of us present to welcome Fr Matt and Annette Goulden who joined us for the day which began with Morning Prayer in the church.

After coffee and a catch up with friends from other communities, Fr Matt spoke to us about St John of the Cross, reminding us of his life and experience and how that influenced his teaching. He spoke of St John's childhood - one of love, poverty and separation in 16th century Spain, his experience of the suffering of others and how this impacted on how he went on to lead his life. Testimonies from those who knew him show that he was always concerned about the poor and the sick but always with the understanding that we are made for more than that, we are made in the image of God; the depths of Christian teaching is for everyone. He commented on Stanza 39 para 7 of the Spiritual Canticle during which St John appealed to his readers to consider 'What are you doing? How are you spending your time" St John says we are all created and called to the freedom of life in Christ. The great gifts of God are given to those who freely choose them. There are obstacles to free choice so God must purify us from all our imperfections and set us free from our 'ignorances', our limited understanding of God and who we are. Our goals may be limited but we are created for something much greater.

Later Annette spoke about the Presidents
Conference recently held in Leeds which brought
together many of the Presidents and Leaders of
communities in England and Wales. She told us of
the need for new ways of welcoming all those who
feel drawn to Carmel: new groups have been
formed to bring the Secular Order closer to
people; new ways are being tried of meeting in

person and online and at retreats. The Holy Spirit is at work within the Secular Order today.

During Mass three of those present made their First Promise: **Beth Flatman, Eszter and Brian Dunleavy**; and two were accepted into Formation: **Emma Maiandi** and **Tandy Tarifiye**.

Central Region - old and new

The regional day for the Central Region was held at Northampton on Saturday 27 September. It was a very special day in the sense that it marked the end of 10 years of wonderful work by our beloved regional representative Cyprian Blamires. Cyprian had retired from this position the previous weekend at the Presidents conference attended by the presidents and leaders of OCDS groups and communities throughout England and Wales. At that same event it was agreed to reorganise the regions (see details later in this *Vine*).

As the day had been arranged months ago, we still went ahead with the old region, and how wonderful it was to see everyone, some for the last time, perhaps.

After joyful greetings and gathering up into morning prayer Fr Matt spoke to us about Saint John of the Cross, giving a general introduction as to what to choose to study, how to read him. Reluctant to answer, he advised and encouraged us to find our way, our own way, as Saint John would tell us himself, 'the answer is already in the person' and he would help them to find their own answer. Reading from Sayings of Light and Love (Prologue, 2nd paragraph): 'Lord, you love discretion, you love light, you love love...', he spoke about how our minds can become an obstacle. about the need to remove obstacles. If we don't understand, good! Let the understanding find you. A word can speak to us and find something in us already experienced. St John sang his songs to lift his spirit up. Let us sing them, imagine them and let them speak to us.

The day continued with silent prayer, with time to ponder on these words, and the Angelus.

Afterwards, Cyprian talked about the

reorganisation of the regions, the use of the internet in Carmel, the Virtual community which meets for Morning prayer and Night prayer, on Zoom.

After a choice of delicious soup and cakes served by the wonderful Cathedral's catering staff, we heard three stories of members' journeys to Carmel in a very relaxed and friendly atmosphere where other members spontaneously asked further questions.



We finished the day with Holy Mass in the Cathedral where **Michael Green** and **Karen Jones** of the Lincoln group made their final promises. A young man called Giuseppe was waiting outside to ask to join the Northampton community. He took the picture above!

Holy Trinity group, Notting Hill

Pilgrimage to St Jude's Shrine in Kent, 8 September

Attached to the Carmelite parish of Our Lady of Mount Carmel and located in a narrow street in the market town of Faversham in the heart of Kent, is St Jude's Shrine which was described as 'a jewel for the diocese' by Archbishop Cyril Cowderoy of Southwark at its opening in 1955.

A wonderful day was spent there on the Feast of

the Immaculate Conception. This was a joint pilgrimage of both Third Order and OCDS group members facilitated by Amanda C. Dickie, Lay member of the Third order.



The feast day of St Jude is on the 28th of October. Perhaps because of the confusion between St Jude's name and that of Judas Iscariot, he was gradually overlooked in the West and became 'the forgotten saint'. By the 20th century, St Jude was relatively unknown to the British Catholic population but had remained popular in India and in Eastern tradition.





He was not in pre-Reformation days much identified with the old Catholic life in Europe. The shrine today is very much a focus of unity attracting pilgrims and visitors of other faiths and Christian traditions. Growing out of a world at war the Shrine of St Jude is a sign of hope and reconciliation. Today, people around a world torn with terrorism in the lands associated with the apostle, turn to St Jude, the patron of hope, for his intercession and hope.

Jude is invoked in desperate situations because his New Testament letter stresses that the community should persevere despite difficult circumstances, just as their forefathers had done before them. Therefore, he became the patron saint of desperate cases. His writing resonates today. 'At the end of time ...there are going to be people who sneer at religion and follow nothing but their own desires. These unspiritual people are nothing but mischief makers' (v.18-19). He is also compassionate offering hope, "when there are some who have doubts, reassure them" (v22).

We were warmly welcomed by the OCarm Friars and enjoyed a very interesting talk and tour by brother Paul who also conducted the anointing with the blessed, healing oil following the Mass in the morning.

The Shrine holds a first-class relic of Saint Jude which is part of his mortal remains in a copy of a monstrance, dated 1547 and is accessible to pilgrims, allowing them to venerate and pray there. The relic provides a physical connection for those seeking healing, hope, and solace in times of difficulty, as it is seen as a reminder of St. Jude's closeness to Christ as a cousin.

We prayed for all Carmelites, friends and families of both Orders, including those who are ill or recently deceased.

PRESIDENTS CONFERENCE 2025

On the weekend of September 19-21 twenty six presidents and three representatives met with members of the National Council for the triennial Presidents Conference. The meeting was held at Hinsley Hall, Leeds, which is the pastoral, conference, and retreat centre for the Catholic Diocese.

In his opening address Fr. Matt reminded us that Presidents have two areas of responsibility:

- Care of the Community they lead
- Duty to the wider Order and the Church, since the community exists for the whole Church and the Order.

This gathering of the Presidents, he said, is the highest authority of the Order in England and Wales since this gathering is concerned with what goes on beyond the local community. It is concerned with where God is calling us now and it requires us to take responsibility. The National Council takes its mandate from this meeting as if it were a standing committee of the Presidents Conference. This time together also allows for the sharing of experiences and challenges, for learning from each other. Being a President was a vocation within a vocation and while each community is autonomous it is never independent. It is always part of the Order and takes its identity from it. Father Matt went on to speak of the work of the Holy Spirit in the great tradition of Carmelite, the spirit of Elijah and the Carmelite saints; a spirit that we live by and try to nurture in others. While life in community can be messy, God is always there.

In her address, Annette Goulden, the President of the National Council, brought us up to date with what's been happening in the Order over the past three years.

There are now 36 Communities of the Secular Order in England and Wales, 21 of which are canonically established and 15 recognised but not established. There is also a virtual group which meets online. 4 communities have closed, and new groups have been formed.

Since the last Conference the National Council has organised the annual Secular Order retreats in a variety of locations: this year there have been retreats in Ampleforth, Douai, Wistaston and Worth. These retreat centres have been booked again for next year.

Deborah Van Kroonenburg, Cyprian Blamires and Joan MacInnes gave accounts of their experience of being Regional Representatives: support given and received, new ways of meeting online, and 'opening doors ' for everyone who feels called to Carmel.

One of the sessions was devoted to discussion groups covering the following topics which generated a lively exchange of ideas:

- Discerning a Carmelite vocation among those entering Formation
- Safeguarding and Code of Conduct
- Providing opportunities for all those called to Carmel
- Communication
- How to develop the relationship of local groups with the wider Order.
- Mutual Support.

Reports from the Treasurer, Phyllis Ibbs and the Registrar, Chris Noble were presented, the latter in absentia because of ill health. Chris is stepping down as Registrar and will be replaced by Cyprian Blamires who also edits the website and told us of the very positive feedback there has been for the site.

Election of the President

There was one application for the role and responsibilities of the National President. This was Annette Goulden of St Elijah Community, Oxford, proposed by Joan Burns and seconded by Emma Halliday. Annette was duly re-elected as National President.

Fr Matt then spoke to us on Stanza 11 of the Spiritual Canticle by St John of the Cross which he described as a spiritual interlude in Canticle B. It speaks of a very specific place in the process of transformation and spiritual growth. The full text of his talk will be made available on the website.

Re-arrangement of the Regions

Cyprian spoke about the proposed re-arrangement of the Regions which had come about partly because of geography where some communities in one region were too far apart to be easily reached and partly because of the demise of some of the smaller communities following Covid.

As a result, it was proposed that the North East and North West Regions should be combined to form one new North Region; Central and West Midlands Regions should be re-aligned to produce three Regions comprising Central, Midlands and a new region of Wales and the Marches. East Anglia, London and South West Regions would remain the same as now.

The Conference approved the changes.

Meetings of all the Regions then took place during which the new Regional Representatives were elected as follows:

Central Region: *Armelle Blecher* of Marie Eugene Community Oxford; proposed by Cyprian Blamires and seconded by Annette Goulden.

East Anglia Region: *Joan MacInnes* of Holy Family, Norwich; proposed by Shirley Lyons, seconded by Hugh Lyons.

London Region: *Christian Kendall-Daw* of Our Lady of Mt Carmel and St Teresa, Kensington; proposed by Josephine Gilbert and seconded by Frances Fogg.

Midland Region: *Martin Auger* of the Birmingham group; Proposed by Cyprian Blamires and seconded by Joan MacInnes

Northern Region: *Emma Halliday* of Our Lady of Mt Carmel Community, Darlington; proposed by Betty Longbottom and seconded by Nora Borg. South West Region: *Deborah Van Kroonenburg* of Our Lady Star of Sea and Ocean, Torquay; proposed by Tim Van Kroonenburg, seconded by Cyprian Blamires

Wales and the Marches Region: *Susan Watson* of Llandrindod Wells; proposed by Cyprian Blamires and seconded by Phyllis Ibbs.

These Representatives now make up your new National Council, along with Annette as National President, Fr Matt as Provincial Delegate, Phyllis Ibbs as Treasurer, Cyprian Blamires as Registrar, Teresa Lynch as Safeguarding Officer. Tim Burton remains as Webmaster.

Annette offered grateful thanks to Mary Farrell, Representative for the North East for many years, to Chris Noble, Registrar and Representative for the North West who have stepped down from the National Council.

The Plenary session summed up the work of the weekend which Fr Matt described as a very fruitful Conference, evidence of the Holy Spirit at work.

CARMELITE MARIOLOGY IN FATIMA
